he 2018-19 school year was very transformational for Gaston Christian School. After three and a half years of praying, planning, and constructing, our Owens Worship and Fine Arts Center was complete. With a very celebratory

ribbon cutting by Dr. Owens, we were officially in the building! As you may imagine, there was lots of prayer about the time frame of the construction. Our desire was that Dr. Owens would be able to officiate the ribbon cutting, but at 105 years old, we knew that time was of the essence. Dr. Owens went to be with the Lord in May of 2019. I would like to extend special thanks to Custom Building Superintendent Scott Pendley for his outstanding job. Scott was passionate to make sure

everything was done with quality and to our satisfaction; we have a wonderful facility to be used by the school and the community at large. Our Fine Arts team, led by Fine Arts Director, Maralie Medlin, has seen a profound increase in the excitement of the students in fine arts classes. One student remarked, "It is so nice to get to come over to the Owens Center and spend some time doing nonacademic activities." With our Christmas programs moving from the gymnasium, chapel services feeling much more like worship, 70 plus students now being able to have ballet and tap dance classes on campus, our Owens Center has been a smashing hit! I would like to thank the hundreds of families who sacrificially gave major gifts to make this dream a reality. We were able to raise over \$2,200,000 for this project. With income from outside groups and proceeds from our school programs, the Owens Center is almost revenue neutral, meaning that almost all expenses are recouped! To have a facility of this quality at little to no additional cost gives even greater value to the outstanding education offered at Gaston Christian School.





STANDARDIZED TESTING SUMMARY REPORT



ast year, Pearson announced that new norms would be used for scoring the spring 2019 Stanford Achievement Test. Whereas the pool of students used for scores in the past was based on a majority of public schools and a much smaller number of private/Christian schools, the new norms are based on a pool comprised primarily of private/Christian schools and a smaller number of public schools. New norms can significantly change test results; percentile differences can differ from the preceding year as much as 20 points, thereby affecting stanines. Our scores reflect such a change. Typically, our scores carry above-average stanines of 7 and 8; this year, our scores reflect stanines of 7 and average stanines of 6. Our test scores may fluctuate over the next two years as teachers and students adjust to the new expectations these norms represent.

HONDURAS MISSION TRIPS

tudents from Gaston Christian School participated in two mission trips to Honduras during the 2018-2019 school year. During the week of March 8-15, high school teacher Mark Moore, 6 high school students, 1 alumna, and 1 parent joined with others from Louder than Words Ministries on a backpacking mission trip through the mountains of western Honduras. These students hiked to 5 different Lenca villages, sharing the Gospel and distributing Operation Christmas Child boxes to the children.

During spring break 35 high school students and 4 adults spent a week with Mark Moore ministering in the small mountain village of Las Mesas. The group conducted a daily VBS program, led worship services each night, provided a free dental clinic each day and participated in home building/repairs. High school students, staff, and parents donated over \$3400 for food and other needed supplies/equipment for the Faith, Hope, and Love Orphanage. What a wonderful opportunity this week provided for the students and adults to share the Gospel of Christ among the Honduran people.

ACADEMIC HIGHLIGHTS

Duke Talent Identification Program (TIP): Thirty-eight seventh grade students qualified for TIP recognition in the fall of 2018. Two students qualified for State Recognition.

National Geographic Bee: After many rounds of competition Delaney Kaylor was selected as the winner of the middle school Geography Bee. Over forty middle school students participated in the competition.

Science Fair: All middle school students participated in the Science Fair this year by submitting class projects. Projects from each grade level were then chosen to compete in the final round held in the gym on March 20, 2019. Ribbons and medals were awarded to the following students: Sixth Grade – Bode Jones 1st Place, Catherine Key and Katelin Vaher 2nd Place, Adelai Hardin 3rd Place; Seventh Grade – Gordon Dubisky 1st Place, Katie Walker 2nd Place, Carson Hill and Riley Rouse 3rd Place; Eighth Grade – Olivia Reed 1st Place, Maddy McKinley 2nd Place, Samantha Hosmer and Evan Reid 3rd Place.

The Junior Beta Club inducted forty-five seventh and eighth grade students qualifying for this honor during chapel on Thursday, March 14, 2019.

GCS Spelling Bee: Luke Kelly was the GCS school-wide Spelling Bee champion this year. He represented GCS well in the Gaston County Spelling Bee and placed third in the competition.

The Einstein Project: Our annual Einstein Contest provided another opportunity for eighth grade students to test their knowledge of all middle school science content. Using a "Jeopardy" format, Cole Dickerson, Connor Joyce, Savion Taylor, and Nick Welfare competed in the Worship Center before the middle school student body. Connor Joyce earned the Einstein Award, a lab coat signed by eighth grade students.

Drama Classes Offered: With the opening of the new Worship Center, middle school students were able to select a Drama elective offered during 8th period. Under the direction of Mrs. Medlin, forty-three students were able to participate in these new courses. Several middle school drama students also participated in the spring drama production.

HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION



Love and serve those around us

hroughout the year staff and students have focused on I John 4:11 as the 2018-2019 theme verse, a verse that challenged us to consider how we can better love and serve those around us; we were daily reminded of His love, faithfulness and goodness to us.

SPIRITUAL FOCUS

Spiritual growth and worship are a vital part of the school's purpose as we encourage our students to live to the glory of God and to "let the word of Christ richly dwell within you"; weekly chapel services focused on this verse from Colossians 3. The annual Windy Gap Retreat in September and the Spiritual Emphasis Day in March were spiritual highlights of the year. In addition, the SGA sponsored a "Night of Worship: The Journey" in April. GCHS participated in two mission trips to Honduras: a backpacking trip and spring break trip in March; both trips were led by faculty member Mark Moore. Students, parents, and staff donated over \$3400.00 to provide food and equipment for the Faith, Hope, and Love Orphanage in Honduras. Three students participated in the Summit Ministries Summer Conference in Manitou Springs, CO in July.

ACADEMIC FOCUS

New curricular adoptions were implemented for Chemistry, AP Chemistry, and Honors Physics. The high school offered 7 in-house Advanced Placement classes this year with additional students enrolled in 5 online AP courses; there were more than 20 honors courses across the disciplines. In addition, a partnership with SevenStar Academy and participation in the N.C. Career and College Promise Program allowed Gaston Christian to offer courses beyond the traditional classroom; 36 students were enrolled in these online programs. GCHS also participated in the concurrent enrollment program at the College of Southeastern, allowing students to earn both high school and college credits. A rising senior has been selected to attend Governor's School in the area of English. The School Counselor organized Information Nights for each grade level and also a Christian College Fair. In the spring the Class of 2021 visited 4 college campuses (Erskine College, North Greenville, NC State, and North Carolina at Chapel Hill) on the Sophomore College Tour.

TECHNOLOGY FOCUS

Integration of technology into classroom instruction continued to enhance learning; e-texts were in these courses: Government/Economics, World History, US History, AP US History, Psychology, AP Biology, Biology, Anatomy and Physiology, Chemistry, AP Chemistry, Hon. Physics, Environmental Science, Spanish I, Spanish II, and Honors Spanish III.

FINE ARTS FOCUS

With the completion of the Owens Center in the fall, high school fine

arts classes moved into the new facility with much excitement. Honors Ensemble, Band, and Theatre Arts classes performed at Fine Arts Evenings in December and May; the Visual Arts classes also showcased their work at these programs. The Gaston Christian Players produced *Still Life with Iris* in March. What a difference the Center is already making in program offerings.

SERVICE OPPORTUNITIES

The high school students and staff were busy this year serving within the community; opportunities included participation in the Crisis Pregnancy Center's Walk for Life and Baby Bundles

project, Operation Christmas Child Shoebox project, a winter clothing drive, a food drive for Second Harvest Food Bank, and participation in the campus fundraising activities for the Breast Cancer Research Foundation.

MOCK TRIAL PROGRAM

The Mock Trial teams participated at regional competitions in Hendersonville and Salisbury, with the White team advancing to the state competition in Raleigh in March.

QUIZ BOWL

The Gaston Christian Quiz Bowl team placed 3rd in the Gaston County Quiz Bowl.

aston Christian School was host to 19 International students from China, Vietnam, and Germany in 2018-19. We had three 9th graders, four 10th graders, six 11th graders, and six seniors.

The heart of our program is our host families. They are vital to the mission of this ministry. The students can read about Jesus in the Bible or

hear stories about Him in Bible class, but it is the host family who shows the love of Christ to our students in a very tangible way. We are blessed with 18 host families; the only double placement of students is for our set of siblings, Suwen (Frank) and Qin (Kasey.) Our host family program includes families with small children, families with teenagers, empty nesters, and grandparents. The host family not only provides for the physical needs of our students, but the social and emotional support as well. They are called to be on mission for Christ as they serve in their very own homes. They plant seeds of faith that, hopefully, one day will take root in the hearts of our students.

We participated in many activities this year. Our fall break trip this year took us to Myrtle Beach, SC. It was a great time for the students to see the ocean and swim. From the pirate show to Hard Rock Café, they had a good time enjoying the food and the entertainment. Over spring break, Mr. Grahl (Chemistry teacher) and his wife served as chaperones for 13 of our International students on a trip to San Francisco. What an exciting time for so many of these students! In the Muir Woods, they saw trees as tall as buildings; they visited the infamous Alcatraz federal prison; they rode bicycles across the San Francisco Bridge and toured the Bay area; they visited the Golden Gate Park; rode trolley cars, and, probably their favorite part—they visited Chinatown and ate food that reminded them of home. A well-rounded education includes experiences, not just books. These students come for an education but it is important that they also have cultural experiences so that when it is time to apply for colleges, they have something to write about. Most of their summers are spent in a classroom in China, continuing to study English and prepare for SAT and the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) for college. They often do not get to experience a vacation with family or have a time of rest.

2018-19 brought a significant opportunity for the international students to tour 2 top 100 colleges/universities in the U.S. We toured the University of South Carolina over fall break and Stanford University over spring break, while experiencing a little Americana in the beautiful city of San Francisco. In March, Allen—one of our international students went with Mr. Moore, our mission's coordinator and Director of Louder Than Words Ministries, on a backpacking trip to Honduras. Also over spring break, 3 students (Alex, Allen, and Eric) went to Honduras with the GCS mission team to minister to the Lenca people group.

We are also proud of Hetong (Alex) Ma (11th grade) who was selected to attend a summer session open to high school students at Yale University. Alex will join other students from around the world as they participate in the Biological & Biomedical Science session of the Yale Young Global Scholars Program.

Lastly, out of the International Student Program has come the International Club here at GCS. American and International students work together to help our students become aware of other cultures and participate in mission opportunities around the world. Our primary mission focus is to sponsor and serve Samaritan's Purse. We also sponsor a mission project for the Honduras mission trip. This past year, our theme was "Let's Comb Together for Missions!" We collected combs, brushes, hats, and hair accessories for Lenca children in Honduras.

FROM THE ACADEMIC DEAN



2018-19 in Academic Review

ay the Lord be praised for blessing Gaston Christian with several notable advancements this school year: Seven new faculty members attended the New Teacher Orientation Day on Friday, August 10, 2018. New faculty spent the day in activities that clarified the GCS mission and teaching-learning objectives. Monthly seminars throughout the year explored a range of critical education topics.

The CESA Institutional Review visit to GCS was confirmed for October 27, 28, and 29, 2019. This process with CESA offers dual Accreditation with AdvancED, now called Cognia.

Because CESA requires students to complete surveys of their courses and teachers in high school, GCS administered its first Student Course Survey in October 2018. Obtained from Dr. Barry Shealy, Curriculum & Faculty Development Director of First Presbyterian Day School in Macon, Georgia, this survey was developed over a period of more than 15 years by several Christian schools and taps into academics, methodology, and biblical integration.

GCS administered its first **Best Christian Workplaces Institute Survey** for Faculty, in October 2018, in partial fulfillment of CESA requirements. This survey is the most widely used Christian survey that provides a wealth of feedback for building a flourishing work environment. BCWI staff assisted us in every step of the process; the debriefing of the interpretation of survey results by online videoconference was phenomenal. Survey results earned GCS certification as a **Best Christian Workplace**!

The Fountas and Pinnell Benchmark Assessment Systems 3rd Edition, a data-based running records system that supports teacher formative assessment of student reading progress, was purchased for the Elementary School. Having trained Grade 1 teachers this year, Learning Support Specialist Gina Stiwalt will continue to expand the program yearly until all grade-level teachers are trained to use the system. Middle School adopted new grammar and Algebra I textbooks while the High School purchased new physical science, geometry, Algebra I, health, and AP Government textbooks. The Dean prepared academic profiles reflecting a three-year history for all eighth-grade students who will enter the high school program in fall 2019 for the purpose of supporting students in their course-selection process.

The Professional Development Library for faculty gained 7 new resources.

Professional development activities for 2018-2019 highlights:

August 6-7: 2018 Teaching & Learning Conference sponsored by the Gaston County Public Schools – 22 GCS teachers attended research-based professional development sessions for a total of 168.75 hours of credits.

Opening In-Service Day, August 13: Dr. Stout announced the new accreditation direction with CESA (Council on Educational Standards & Accountability) that carries dual accreditation AdvancED; the Dean

briefed the faculty on details. Officer Robinson provided security updates. January 2 In-Service Day: Given the completion of the Owens

Center, Dr. Stout briefed the faculty on "Looking Forward," giving details of how GCS would concentrate on advancement and innovation in educational offerings, spiritual growth opportunities, professional development, leadership training, and investment in advanced degrees.

March 8 In-Service Day: "Continuous Improvement" – Dr. Stout updated faculty on enrollment, Boosterthon fund-raising results and next school year initiatives. He announced plans for departmental/grade-level faculty luncheons to discuss the BCWI Faculty Survey results.

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
